Early Modern and Modern Studies in London and York: Summer 2020 Laura Nice and Jason Nice

Program Description

This one-month program introduces students to the arts, ideas, and history of Britain and Europe by visiting cultural sites London and York with excursions across England.

HUMN 300: Great Books and Ideas: Arts/Humanities, Laura Nice

Focusing on Britain from Shakespeare to the Present, this course explores the history of Britain through its arts and ideas – literary, visual, architectural, and theatrical – in person. We will begin at Hampton Court Palace where students will experience Tudor social, political and cultural history by viewing outstanding examples of art, architecture, and interior/landscape design. Then, we will see a performance at Shakespeare's reconstructed Globe Theatre (having already read the play). We will tour Middle Temple Hall, studying the Tudor architecture and history of the legal profession, and discuss the Baroque, Classicism, and Romanticism at Saint Paul's and Tate Britain. Students will then experience the massive impact of exploration and science at Whitby (Captain Cook) in Yorkshire, and the Old Operating Theatre and Freud Museum in London. Then, as there is no substitute for visiting works of art in person, we will spend an entire day at the National Gallery, focusing especially on nineteenth-century art, before reading and tracing the footsteps of the Bloomsbury Group, and watching a contemporary West End play. We will finally experience twentieth-century history and art history at the Imperial War Museum, Churchill War Rooms, and Tate Modern.

HIST 313: Early Modern Europe, Jason Nice

In this course, students learn the history of Europe from the Renaissance through the Napoleonic Wars by visiting a range of cultural sites and museums in and around London and Yorkshire. The site visits will proceed chronologically, and will thus provide students with a compelling and thought-provoking narrative of European history. For example, we will set the stage for the Renaissance by learning about prehistoric history with visits to Stonehenge and the British Museum, and medieval history with visits to Salisbury Cathedral (Magna Carta), Westminster Abbey, and the Tower of London. We will explore the history of the Renaissance at Hampton Court Palace before heading north to York where we will review medieval history (Wars of the Roses at the Richard III Museum, and anti-Semitism at Clifford's Tower) before studying the Reformation at parish churches, cathedrals, and monasteries across Yorkshire. The Merchant Adventurer's Hall in York will be our venue for learning about the new global (capitalist) economy, and Castle Howard will be the setting for our reflections on the Scientific Revolution and Enlightenment.

Assignments

HUMN 300

Students will produce a variety of short response papers based on reading assignments (typed/emailed or handwritten) and write one essay due at the end of week two. The essay (typed/emailed or handwritten) will require analysis of the reading assignments in light of the new knowledge and experience of the physical spaces associated with those texts.

HIST 313

Students will produce a variety of short response papers based on reading assignments (typed/emailed or handwritten). At the end of the third week of the program, students will prepare a presentation that uses Magna Carta to analyze whether or not Richard III was the tyrant depicted by Shakespeare, drawing upon information gleaned from the Richard III and Henry VII experiences in York. Presentations will be delivered at Rievaulx Abbey.
